THE VON BRAUN'S FIRST SHUTTLE IS LAUNCHED!

Besides its own commissioning, one of the crowning achievements of a starship is the launching of a shuttle. Launched on September 11, 1995, the shuttle Alabama is the Wernher von Braun's first shuttle. CMDR Bonnie Flannigan is its Commanding Officer and CMDR Chyrstal Kimbro is the Executive Officer. Their meetings are at 2 PM on the third Sunday of every month in the Wheeler Basin Regional Library on highway 31 in Decatur. Already, they have approximately 10 STARFLEET members and 8 non-STARFLEET members, which is well over the 5 member requirement by STARFLEET for shuttles.

Bonnie discussed her and her crew's plans for the Alabama at Con*Stellation. (See the accompanying article elsewhere for a con review.) For the first year they will not have membership dues. Instead, they will hosting several fund-raisers in order to cover their expenses. Their plans to sell hot chocolate during the annual Decatur Christmas parade didn't do well due to warm weather, so they're going to try at the boat light show. They also hope to raffle a quilt for charity and sell homemade candles. One of their long range plans are to host their own convention in the new Decatur Civic Center.

So far the response from the people in Decatur has been favorable. "I think the priority should be fun," said Bonnie. Although they will do community service, it will not be their main focus. Even "little things can reflect a lot," such as their

How to write your own departmental report.

As promised, this week I'm going to tell everyone the secret of writing a departmental report.

Hopefully, this will encourage all the department heads to write a report for the newsletter, which hasn't happened yet, much to my frustration. So after this month, I don't want to hear any excuses that you don't know how.

First, you don't have to be an excellent writer. Departmental reports aren't like a graduate thesis on the complexities of the inter-relationship of printed words. They can be as simple as writing a letter to a friend or holding a conversation. I know everyone has probably written at least one letter in their life. I'll worry about spelling and all the other technical details so you just have to provide the information. Furthermore, I even accept handwritten material (though I prefer electronic submissions), which makes report writing exactly like writing to a friend. If it helps, think of me as a penpal that you correspond with on a monthly basis.

Second, approach departmental reports in a relaxed, carefree way. Sure, I'm always begging for submissions and have even included a deadline that adds more pressure, but it isn't that big of a deal. If you miss one deadline, I can always save it for the next month if there isn't enough time to include it in the current issue. You aren't being graded or reviewed for what you write (at least not by me anyway), so you don't have to worry about it being perfect, or even good. Think of the report as a fun way to express yourself as opposed to a requirement.

OK, that takes care of the incentive to write, but what exactly do you write about? Well, that's going to vary from department to department, so I can't give you a specific answer there. Obviously, whatever your department's responsibilities are will also be what your report is about. Or at least, that's the general idea: tell us your departments plans and activities.

Third, tell what your department did over the past month. Did you hold a departmental meeting? Did your department complete a project? Did it do anything at all? Did new members join it?

You don't have to be a skilled writer since anyone can write a report.

Approach departmental reports in a relaxed, carefree way to express yourself.

Tell what your department did over the past month.

Tell what your department is planning in the near future.

Relate other events you were involved with to your department.

Make something up or change an existing story so it relates to your department.

(Don't forget to include important details of your events like who, what, when, why, where, or how.)

Did any of your planned activities or projects fail? Did they succeed? Why or why not? Have you done this before? How did it compare to previous times or similar activities? Did other people outside your department attend? Was the community involved? Did something unexpected happen? Did something wonderful happen? Did you have fun? Will you do it again? Tell an amusing story that occurred involving you or the department. Juicy gossip is always good reading (though be aware of personal feelings please, and be responsible). You get the idea I hope.

DRC SECURITY

CMDR Dustin Williams, the *Wernher von Braun*'s Security Chief, has been appointed Assistant Director of STARFLEET's DRC Security program. Dustin began the application process at this years International Conference in June along with several other candidates. 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General discussion was held on the status of the *von Braun*. Some of the problems the facing the ship were debated, including attendance and membership problems. Various ideas were discussed to alleviate them such as being more friendly at meetings. Car pools were suggested in case attendance was simply a matter of not being able to get here.

More social activities were suggested as to increase numbers and participation. It was pointed out that no one takes the initiative to do anything. Or, no one is willing to help except for a small core group The crew, even Huntsvillians in general, seems to be apathetic to participating in anything. Various ideas were exchanged to help, including a special planning meeting to discuss problems in detail

A motion was passed to contact the members by phone to get a general idea of why they aren't coming to meetings, and to invite them back. Additionally, by January a survey is to be mailed to members in order to get their feedback on the ship.

The possibilities are directly proportional to what you and your department do. If you didn't do anything and you have nothing to report about, that might indicate you need to work on your department's participation level. The more activities your department is involved in, the more fun you will have, which will in turn influence the ship as a whole, making it more fun. It's really quite a mind-boggling synergistic effect. Even if you didn't do anything, tell us. At least we'll know and won't assume something worse. Knowing is better than not knowing.

Fourth, tell us what your department is planning on doing, which is the converse of tip three. Will you be holding a departmental meeting? What projects and activities do you have planned? Have you done this before? How will it compare to previous times or similar activities? What exactly will be happening? What are your expectations and goals? And so forth...

Ideally, this should focus on the time period between the current issue and the proposed date of the next issue. However, you may wish to include the next few months so as to allow people plenty of time to plan ahead. Furthermore, any long term goals or major activities are perfect for mentioning. Here's your chance to get the word out on what you and your department are planning.

Don't forget to include all the necessary information, like who, what, when, where, why, and how. These details include who is invited, who or what the activity is the for, who to contact, what will be going on, what is expected of everyone, when the time and date is to occur, where it will be, why this event is going to happen, how much it will cost, and how the event will be done. Details on individual aspects of the event may be needed as well. For example, if you're hosting a planning party for a project, don't forget the main information, but you may need to include info on help you will need, transportation and directions to your place, times when it will end, when certain sub-activities will occur, etc. Granted this is overkill for most everything, but too much information is usually better than too little.

Fifth, tell us what you or your department has been involved in. I've discussed what activities you have been responsible for; I'm referring to other departments' activities, ship activities, or activities in general. Did you go to any meetings or events? Did

the event succeed or fail? Did you have fun? Will you go again? Have you been before? How did it compare to previous times or similar activities? Did something unexpected happen? Did something wonderful happen? Tell an amusing anecdote about what happened. Did you even crawl out of your house at all?

For example, say you went to a convention, perhaps STARFLEET's International Conference. Give your opinion of the conference from your, or your department's, point of view. I'd like for people to write entirely separate and "reporter" style articles (which will be a future report) for such major events; that's why I want you to focus on the departmental/personal aspect in your report. Rant and rave about something, or give credit and praise where they're due. Your report is your opportunity to voice your opinions and concerns.

Finally, make something up. No, I'm not referring to spreading vicious rumors about the commanding officer; I'm referring to letting your creative side loose and letting it run wild. Tell a short story, or warp a real occurrence into a fictional one. For example, on my former ship, we had a second officer whose official duties were unfortunately (or fortunately depending on your perspective) few and far between. So when he ran out of the official stuff, he would make something up. One time he pretended to have a mock interview with *Hitchhikers' Guide to the Galaxy*. Another time, he "reported" on Starfleet's directives for dealing with alien life forms. ("Borg: See entry in Fleet Computer Operations Manual. In brief, avoid.") This is the same thing you can do. However, ideally, try to relate it to your department in some way. Otherwise, I may toss it in as short fiction instead of as a departmental report.

I suppose none of these suggestions will help if you have old fashioned writers' block, but they are a start at least. I may cover ways to help you write in a future report or article, but I'm sure there are books in the library that can help you get over your fears of writing in general much better than I can. This was designed specifically to help you write departmental reports. Future articles will cover writing event summaries and reviews, as well as tips on making the information you do have stretch even further. (This is suggestion four in action.)

The low-down on the latest constellation in the sky.

When I went down to STARFLEET's International Conference, I was awed by the stories I had heard of other people talking about Con*Stellation. I was struck by the wonderful stories of a con suite that had bounties fit for a king and a costume contest on par with those of huge conventions. I just had to go and see for myself. As the convention approached, I became sick and was dubious to even attend for fear of giving others my cold. This year the fourteenth annual convention, hosted by the North Alabama Science Fiction Association on November 3-5 at the Tom Bevill Center, honored the constellation

Minor located below and above. The Guest of Honor was Rick Shelley, Toastmaster was Roland Castle, Artist Guest of Honor was Ruth Thompson, and Fan Guest of Honor was Adrian

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Friday's activities were started off with opening ceremonies, which I was absent from.
