On behalf of Jerry Lewis and the MDA I would like to thank the following people for their selfless donation of their invaluable time and selves to make this worthy cause a success: Rebecca Self, Anya Funderburk, Tom Perry, and Russ McNutt. Without their assistance, and that of the many other volunteers. I am certain that we could have never broken our local record and brought in a total of \$200,221.00. This is not just a new local record, but a new record for the entire state. Thanks guys.

I would like to ask everyone to save themselves an empty Pringles can, cut a slot in the top of it, then start dropping in your loose pocket change each night into the can. I would really like to be able to come up with AT LEAST \$1000 by next September so that we can present the check for the amount collected to the MDA at next years telethon. We can not only help fight a debilitating, crippling, and killing disease,

COMMUNICATIONS

Creating a newsletter.

This time around I thought I'd share with you what goes into putting one of these little monstrosities together. Despite what you may think, they don't just leap forth from my computer by themselves. Advances in computers have come a long way, but they're still not that talented.

After finishing an issue and handing it to everyone, I generally don't even want to even think about a newsletter again for quite a while. However, this adverse reaction wears off after a few weeks and I do begin to review how to last issue went. I will reread the issue to see what mistakes I can find. This includes not only spelling, grammar, and other technical errors; but also major errors such as incorrectly labeled pictures or wrong page numbers on the "To be continued" articles. While I don't specifically write these things down. I do make mental notes of them and try to avoid them in the future. If, however, it is something wrong like an incorrect spelling of a name or the wrong phone number (I managed to mangle Dallas's number in the crew listing on the last page big time. Sorry.) for something that is repeated in every issue, I change it immediately in the newsletter template. It's also during this phase that I usually correct the changes that occur to people leaving or being appointed to new positions.

During the second month I try to do the majority of the writing that needs to be done by me. This would include any feature articles as well as my reports. I also try to develop some idea of what I want this particular issue to look like. I try to have some idea of what the cover will be and what articles will go into the issue. I also spend this month scouring the internet for any interesting information that I can put into an article, including accompanying pictures that help alleviate the boring text.

Let me touch upon two ongoing articles that I compile and edit. My CO and Communications reports are generally straight forward. I pick a topic and start rambling. These are fairly easy to produce, so that's why I don't understand why some Department Chiefs have such a hard time doing their reports. The other articles I can write during this time include meeting minutes and reviews. Actually, it's best to do those immediately after an event so all the information will be fresh. Otherwise, it gets to be an interesting mystery game to piece together all the little aspects that crop up.

I also make subtle changes in the fine print during this time. If you've never read the newsletter's fine print, do so as it actually changes with every issue, and is often times quite funny. For example, there's the

obvious tag lines for the issue on the inside front cover. I

try to summarize the entire newsletter's focus into these two lines, but through a humorous slant. Then scroll on down to the bottom of the page into the traditional fine print. In the middle of the first paragraph is usually a funny phrase pertaining to newsletter production. Then at the end of the paragraph, I have a weird abbreviation to go with the others. At the end of the last paragraph, is usually a funny phrase pertaining to copyrights. And finally, near the back is the phrase that describes our crew in a humorous way on the Information block. When we were digest size, there use to be a funny phrase mixed in with the Address Correction Requested on the mailing back. While making these changes, I also modify the volume and issue numbers on the front and inside covers, as well as in the page number bar.

The third month is when everything falls into place. Hopefully, I will have received all the departmental reports and other submissions by the beginning of the month. If so, I can start editing them into a format appropriate for inclusion in the newsletter. I don't change what is said; I only correct errors. I also add the article opening tagline and the closing signature. Unfortunately, I have never had a full complement of reports. And until recently, I didn't have many additional article submissions. Many thanks to anyone who has ever, or will ever, submit an article. This is hopefully done the first week or so of the third month.

Second and third weeks are spent writing the articles that can only be written at the last minute. These are the Sci-Fi news and information articles including rumors and episode guides. Most of this information is taken from the net. It's also the articles that tend to have the most technical errors in them. It's also during this time that I try to gather any remaining pictures or articles that may be needed. By the end of the third week, I try to have everything written and ready to be tossed into the newsletter.

Magic begins on the fourth week as I fire up PageMaker 6.0 and begin the actual construction on the newsletter. The first thing I do is place the departmental reports, trying to keep them grouped at the beginning. Other than CO and XO reports, which should go first, the other depart-

mental reports are arranged in random order depending on their length and their information. Following that, I insert the articles and other tidbits of information that may be of use. I try to avoid doing "To be continued" footers, but sometimes it just doesn't happen. However, I try to keep them all in one location, or in sequential order. While placing them, I try to leave space for appropriate pictures and side-bar articles. The side-bar articles can either be additional information about something, such as a smaller follow-up report or correction, or it can be something that doesn't quite warrant an entire article unto itself, such as a top 10 list or joke.

The cover is a touchy area. I would prefer to do some type of artwork or graphics on the cover, since an image is easier for quick identification than text. However, I don't want to simply use digitized images from TV or movies as the image needs to be unique to us and that issue. As a result, I usually have to decide upon an article important enough to be a cover story.

For every article that I do, I have to adjust the article header. This involves changing two separate graphic elements and a text element, depending on the size and location of the article header. If it's a departmental report, I also have to place the department's logo and deal with text wrapping around

the image. Then I actually place the article text and convert it all over into a standard style. I then change the opening and closing taglines into a different standard style. Then it's a matter of spacing out multi-page articles, remembering to leave space for pictures. Occasionally, I have to make manual changes to indenting, tabs, or other layout features if it's a side-bar or the article contains special parts.

Once the articles are placed. I start inserting the pictures and other side-bars. Each picture usually has an associated frame and caption with it that needs modifying. Re-sizing is almost always required with an occasional cropping of certain parts to make things fit. Sometimes even text wrapping will be needed which can either work very well or be a major pain. Side-bars require an article header and a frame to adjust. Where needed, I also drop in the "To be continued" and "Continued from page" footers and headers on articles.

Finally, a draft copy is printed. Ideally, I try to wait as long as possible, at least one day, between printing the draft and re-reading it for errors. I've discovered that no matter how many times I proof-read the document, I always discover more errors in the printed version better than the screen version. I then create the table of contents, which is a fertile place for errors. I type those in

by hand on the spot, and often make mistakes, which is bad given the TOC is probably the most important tool of any newsletter. I then make any changes from the first draft before printing the second draft. Hopefully, there's enough time to hand this over to my ADC for proofing in addition to my own checking.

Proofing involves much more than looking for spelling and grammatical errors. I check for wrong page numbers, incorrectly or poorly labeled caption or side-boxes, wrong page continuation numbers, missing taglines, and pictures are located in the correct position, among other things. However, there is an aesthetic side to proofing as well. Not

only do I have to make sure that each individual page has a good balance of text and graphical elements, but each opposing page as a whole is balanced correctly. This is the part where my perfectionist, anal-retentive side can get out of hand. But at a certain point, usually 5 AM on the last day, you just have to say, "it's good enough," and go on with the master printing.

While I try to keep everything on the computer, sometimes an occasional manual paste-up is required. This is usually limited to a one or two items, such as original artwork, cartoons, camera ready ads, etc. Once these are affixed to the master prints, I carry everything down to Kinko's to be copied. The problems that can occur here are numerous, and have been detailed in my past reports. I have them collate the pages together since that's practically built into the copying process. All that's left for me to do is the stapling. Since that's a small expense I can do for free, I save the ship a bit of money. If we are doing the digest size format, some folding may be involved, but that's no big deal either.

Now, if you believe I actually do all this by that time table, you are sadly mistaken. The first two months I rarely do anything other than think about what I want to do with the next issue. As a result, each week of the third month is spent doing about a month's worth of work. That's why the newsletter is so often late. I admit to being a bad procrastinator and putting things off till the last few weeks. However, I seem to do fairly decent work under pressure. It just doesn't help my stress levels. Another reason is I'm usually playing catch up on the things that got put off from the previous issue. Or simply having a life; take your pick.

Anyway, that's the process of putting this newsletter together. Hopefully now you will have a better understanding of how difficult this may be. I haven't even touched upon the mental and physical aspects of this. Suffice to say, the late hours, the lack of sleep, the pressure of deadlines, the desire to make a quality publication, and more can take quite a toll upon an editor.

Of course, I realize some of you may not enjoy writing. That's when you can turn to other sources, such as the internet or a co-author. Time permitting, I can help you write your article or co-author it if you want. At the very least give me your suggestions if there is an article you WANT to see. I can do my best to write it, or try to find something appropriately similar.

This time around, however, I was pleasantly surprised with quite a few submissions. I noticed most of these came from the web and other sources. If you do submit something from another source, please make sure you credit that source. Even if it is from the web and an author is unidentifiable, say so.

These other source submissions are greatly appreciated, but personal material that you create would be even better. After all, anyone can find these web sources, but they can't read your mind (unless they're Vulcan). Besides, I'm sure people would much rather hear your opinions, feelings, and ideas instead of someone they've never met. You also don't have an excuse any more. My last report detailed how anyone can do a review of anything, and a previous report explained how a department chief can easily develop material for their report.

One more thing I'd like touch upon before closing this report. When writing an article or report, please remember the time frame that the newsletter will be published in. The delay between when you write an article and when you actually receive the newsletter can be over a month even if the publication is on time. This is an unfortunate result of having a quarterly newsletter, but it's the best we can do with the amount of funds, time, and submissions available.

For example with the next issue: Since the official deadline is the beginning of January, you will probably be writing your submission in late December. However, I won't edit those submissions until January as I prepare for a

SHUTTLE CELESTIAL

Introducing the new shuttle Celestial.

On August 18, 1997, the Celestial officially launched as the second shuttle of the USS Wernher von Braun. Commander Rebecca Self commands NCC 72069/2 along with a crew of approximately nine individuals. Alice Strange serves as the Executive Officer as well as Medical Officer. Some other former WvB members round out the crew, including Chyrstal Kimbro as the Second Officer and Finance Officer, and Kenneth Kimbro as the Judge Advocate General and Computer Science Officer. Some of the crew's family members also walk the halls. including Jeanette and Sophia Self, Niles Kimbro, Curtis Strange, Jeffery Self, and Thomas Carpenter.

The origins of the Celestial go back to over 10 years ago with Rebecca's roots in Birmingham. She had affiliated loosely with the chapters there, but never joined officially until 1988 during the pre-Jeanette Maddox years. However, she was put off by the local arguing that occurred among the chapters then, and felt there "had to be a better way." When the USS Paramount morphed into the current USS Hephaestus as a result of problems with their previous Commanding Officer, she ended up serving as their Executive Officer. During this time she learned the skills needed to be in command.

It's also during this time as XO, that Rebecca met and became friends with Alice, who shared a desire to start their own shuttle. They both realized they had a spiritual side that both thought would be a good focus for the shuttle. Rebecca is a member of the Episcopal Church, and belongs to a religious group called Daughters of the King. Alice, who is a member of the Third Order of Saint Francis, is also an Episcopal Church member along with her husband. However, most members of the *Celestial* continue to make spirituality and Star Trek a part of their lives.

Now fast forward a few vears to the forming of our ship's first shuttle, the Alabama. While Rebecca lived and worked in Birmingham still, she would commute to Decatur almost weekly to visit her parents. She began affiliating with the Alabama gang and became their Operations Officer. Unfortunately, problems and personal disagreements arose, and the thought of starting their own shuttle arose again. She used this time to learn from us, and plan how to go about launching a shuttle. She is glad they waited as long as they did though, because they were learning more and more.

The gathering crew also learned a lot at the Region 2 summit in March. Rebecca, Alice, and Chyrstal were in attendance to learn from the

panels and to get to know the people in the Region 2 hierarchy. As the year progressed, they continued to gain members, and start laying down the groundwork to launch. Finally, in early August, they submitted the paperwork to me to be launched as a shuttle. I made sure the paperwork was complete, signed my name as Commanding Officer of their mothership, and sent the package on to the Regional Coordinator for approval. Then we waited to see if Kelly thought another shuttle was a worthwhile endeavor. Then as August came to a close, I received an Email from Mike Henigan, Kelly's Chief of Staff, stating that Shuttle Operations Command had approved the Celestial's launching.

Despite having half their members in Birmingham, half in Decatur, and a few spaced along the way, they chartered their chapter in Leeds, Alabama, which is just southeast of Birmingham. Since their membership is spread out over a large distance, they originally considered being a correspondence chapter. However, they chose against it for several reasons. First, they wanted to be able to hold regular meetings, which, apparently, correspon-



dence chapters are not suppose to do, although they can gather for parties at already established events. Second. Rebecca felt commanding a shuttle via correspondence would be difficult. Using E-mail might have been easier than postal mail, but she lacked full-time computer access. Plus, they wanted everyone to have as much of an equal chance to participate as possible. Nor did most of the crew want to do a lot of writing. Of course, Leeds is close to Birmingham, where Rebecca's idea for a shuttle first began.

Spirituality remains the focus though. However, that does not mean just the spiritual focus of the Christian religion. They hope to further Gene Roddenberry's dream of a better future where people celebrate Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations. Sure, most of the crew are of the mainstream Christian faith, but that doesn't mean they aren't open to other beliefs. For example, Rebecca has been known to sit under a pyramid. People should join the Celestial for their interest in Star Trek first. And hopefully along the way, they will discover religion as a way of life too. She hopes that by bettering themselves through knowledge in the world and beyond, they will have a better ship.

The shuttle actually meets twice a month with the exact dates and times determined the month before. Those in Decatur meet at the begin-

ning of the month and those in Leeds and Birmingham meet at the end of the month, with several of the Executive Committee members meeting in the middle of the month to plan things. If that wasn't enough, once a quarter they meet in the middle at a small town called Blountsville. If you want to attend one of their meetings, contact Rebecca, Alice, or Chyrstal to pinpoint the next one. Rebecca says she's in contact with someone from the shuttle on almost a nightly basis, so communication among the members shouldn't be a problem. Members also try to get together socially outside of meetings as well.

They hope to do quite a bit of community service even if that means starting small. For example, crewmembers have already helped in Wernher von Braun projects such as the Runway Run and the Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon. Several members are also pursuing individual projects. At the Crisis Center in Birmingham, Alice trained to talk over the phone to people in crisis situations. Her husband collected money during the months of August through November for the Shriners' Crippled and Burned Children Hospitals. Kenneth has also been teaching a sign-language class to the members, which he eventually hopes to open up to other Fleet members or to the public. For a upcoming group project, they are working with the Leeds

Welfare Center gathering enough food for a nice Christmas "basket" for a needy family.

Of course, they do have a fun side as well. They held a launching party on August 23 in which they invited several north Alabama chapters to attend, including a couple members of the von Braun. The crew spent the morning and afternoon at Delano Park in Decatur, having a wonderful time with the picnic and games. Crewmembers are also encouraged to develop personas for themselves. Their main focus. however, will always be toward community service. Eventually, they'd like to do enough fundraising to be able to donate \$100 to \$1000 to a charitable organization. One of the fundraisers they have is a swear jar. Any time someone cusses or swears, they must make some type of monetary donation to the jar. Apparently, they had a huge number of donations about the time they worked on the shuttle's by-laws.

Also, for those of you, including yours truly, who like to take an occasional nip every now and then: Starfleet Academy shot glasses are now

available. Quark says that these items are guaranteed to be a hit at your next party. Cost is \$8.

For you die hard Bones McCoy fans: Dr. McCoy's Medical Kit is being made available again. This kit contains a replica of the Doctor's universally famous medical scanner and wound healer. These items actually light up too. A Starfleet Medical School Diploma is included also. But please remember, the Diploma does not give you the right to start being a doctor: the AMA would give the whole Fleet a dirty look. Cost for the kit is \$15.

For you fans of Captain Kirk: The Kirk *Galileo* Shuttlecraft and figure are available once again. This item first appeared during the 30 year *Trek* celebration of 1996. Cost is \$25.

For you book worms: Quark has written, with Ira Steven Behr and Robert Hewitt Wolfe, a book called *The Legends of the Ferengi*. This work delves into the culture, and profit making ways of this curious race. Whether it works for the rest of us, we'll have to wait and see. Cost is \$12.

For you clock watchers, there are new *Trek* watches, and clocks, galore. In fact, there are so many new ones, that I invite everybody to check them out in the Quark section of the *Communicator* magazine.

One more item for the book worms: the *Day of Honor* Series books one and two are now in the book stores. This is a four book collection spanning the Klingons, from TOS to VOY.

That's all for now folks, but keep tuned in for that good collectible, and let me in on it for a write up in this article.

Hello again STARFLEET fans, once again, it's time for our giant leap into the hallowed halls of the *Trek* Collectible.

Good news for the PC crowd: *Starfleet Academy* is now in the stores. I got my copy on the day of its release and it has some GOOD GRAPHICS. William Shatner, George Takei, and Walter

Koenig reprise their *Trek* roles for this one. The game is on CD-ROM and requires Windows 95, running on a

minimum of a Pentium-90 processor. Cost is \$59.95. A game guide is also available, for those who get blown up several hundred times, like yours truly, for \$19.95.

Staying on the PC kick for a moment; Interplay Games, producers of *Starfleet Academy*, have another game in the works with a release date of either Christmas 1997 or early 1998. The game is entitled *Vulcan's Fury*, a TOS based game, starring the voices of the original TOS cast. The preview can be watched while installing *Starfleet Academy*. It looks impressive.

Now for the book worms in our audience: the four part *Trek* series *Day of Honor* is now in the book stores. The series is set around the Klingon Empire and it covers all four *Trek* series. Part one is TNG; part two is DS9; part three is VGR and part four is TOS. Several authors have contributed to this work and it should make for some interesting reading.

Staying with the book worms for a moment: a new TNG hard cover novel, entitled *Ship of the Line*, is hitting the bookstores. The author is *Trek* novelist, Diane Carey. The plot involves the first voyage of the new *Enterprise-E*, which does not, as some might think, take place under the command of Captain Jean-Luc Picard. Instead, the first voyage takes place under the command of the time transplanted Captain Morgan Bateson, who was

played by Kelsey Grammer (AKA Dr. Frasier Crane of *Cheers* and *Frasier* fame) in the TNG episode where the *Enter-prise-D* was destroyed about three or four times in a time loop. Thank goodness for Data saving the day on that one.

Beware of renegade Klingons who want to take over the ship and invade Cardassia Prime. Sounds like a thriller. An audio version of this work is forthcoming.

Gotta go back to the PC crowd for a moment: Pocket Books is announcing a revised *Trek* Encyclopedia which will be available in trade paperback and CD-ROM multimedia. This is complete and up-to-date through all of the *Trek* Series. Look for a release date near the end of 1997.

One more item for the book worms: Marc Okrand, developer of the Klingon language, has written a new work entitled: *Star Trek: Klingon for the Wayward Traveller*. This is designed for folks who want to know enough about the Klingons in order to avoid embarrassment or possible death, should one insult a Klingon's honor. This work is in the book stores now and sells for \$12.95.

Before I close, I would like to extend another great big thanks to Leslie Shinault, from my old ship the USS *Guardian*. Leslie has published complete information on all of the *Trek* action figures that have been manufactured to date in the *Guardian* newsletter *Gateway*.

This should be a big help to collectors when buying new figures or trying to wheel and deal for other figures. Well done Leslie and family.

For all the book worms in our audience, Judith and Garfield Reeves-Stevens have authored a new work based on the tenth anniversary of *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. This book looks at the characters, producers, episodes, and behind-the-scenes of this universally loved show, which ran for seven successful seasons, 1987-1994, and produced two motion pictures. This is a big hardcover book, produced by Pocket Books. Price is \$35.



A quick diversion for the movie buffs, Jonathan Frakes has been signed to direct the next TNG movie. All of the TNG cast have signed up, with the possible exception of Gates McFadden (AKA Dr. Beverly Crusher). Rumor has it that Diana Muldaur will return as Dr. Kate Pulaski for this movie. Principal photography on the movie is to begin in early 1998.

For the PC buffs: two new items are in release. the Captain's Chair, a CD-ROM feature which includes tours of the bridges of five *Trek* starships, including the *Defiant*, of DS9, and Voyager. This program uses the Quick Time Virtual Reality software package, which is installed at program installation. Quick Time gives the viewer a 360 degree view of the object he/she is looking at. For \$49.95, this program runs under Windows 95 on a Pentium processor.

The second PC item in release is the revised *Star Trek: Encyclopedia* CD-ROM.

This is a revision of the previous trade paperback *Encyclopedia*, and it is update to all of the current areas of the *Trek* Universe, including the current seasons of DS9 and *Voyager*.

The *Encyclopedia* is also available in trade paperback form. Cost for both is \$50.

Here's a pre-holiday heads up for all you Xmas tree trimmers: Hallmark has its new *Trek* decorations coming out. Highlighting the collection this year is the light-up model of the DS9 flagship, the *Defiant*. Cost is \$24.95. Also included this

year is the Data Ornament, which shows Data sitting at his OPS Station on the *Enterprise-D* bridge. Cost of this ornament is around \$24.95.

For the book worms: the novelization of the VGR episode "Day of Honor" is now in release. Here we see B'Elanna Torres and Tom Paris get a little close together as Torres fears to celebrate this solemn Klingon ritual. This novel was written by Michael Jan Friedman, based on the screenplay by Jeri Taylor.

Other novels in release are: *Heart Of The Sun*, a TOS novel and *Trial By Error*, a DS9 novel.

T-SHIRTS AND NAME BADGES

Stuff for sale, and the trials and tribulations to produce them.

Originally included in the CO's report, this was gonna tell you all about the delays and problems associated with producing the name-tags and T-shirts. However, it quickly grew into a more mammoth tale demanding its own article for a thorough explanation. When this happened I decided to add a little more to it and make it a quartermaster report. So, let the sales pitch begin.

Let's start at the bottom line: T-shirts are \$10 each and name-tags are \$3 each. For T-shirts you need to specify a color and size. For name-tags you need to specify what information you want included on the back. I also need to have a scanned picture of you. If you don't have one, I can use my video camera to record your image and digitize it myself.

We also have buttons available for sale. The older ones are 50 cents each, or 3 for \$1. They are also usually given as a door prize at the meetings. The newer buttons are \$1 each, or 6 for \$5. I will generally make those as you watch so as not to waste the button materials on a non-selling design image. I can also make custom buttons for you for \$1 or more each, depending on how much work I do. You can also supply your own image to make into a button. Haven't you ever had a favorite saying you wish you good make into a button? Or

how about an incredible picture. All buttons are 2½ inches in diameter with a pin backing. I can also make the buttons with a magnetic, mirror, or sticky back; or even into a key chain! Of course, those options cost \$2 extra each. I can even add 3 different size and colored rosettes for an additional \$3 each. Colored streamers, some with preprinted sayings, are an additional \$1.

Buttons would make a great gift to someone any time of year for any occasion. Furthermore, part of the money collected will go to the ship and part will go to cover my supply costs. Remember, all checks need to be payable to the "Wernher von Braun." In any event, make sure we give you a receipt for your payment, and indicate what it is for. Receiving your order in writing would also be a huge help.

Now that I've thrown the sales pitch your way, let me tell you what went wrong that caused the T-shirts and name tags to be so late. The idea was

originally tossed around the middle of last year. I asked someone to pursue T-shirts since his dad was in the business, and had a wonderful transfer process. Unfortunately, real life got in the way and he was unable to comply.

Then this year the idea got kicked around again. By this time, however, I had acquired an ink jet printer capable of printing iron-on T-shirt transfers at 360 dpi. I could do it all myself. Or at least I could if I had the time, which was not often given I was busy either doing a newsletter, CO duties, or other life obligations. The Spring and Summer issue really delayed me, as did my life around May and June, which are super busy months for me.

However, during that time, I was able to design the name tags and T-shirts, and vote on them at the meeting. Getting everyone to decide on a color and slogan was not easy. We probably would have preferred an ash gray color, but the ironon process didn't look as well on them, plus we had several white t-shirts left over from the last time. There was also the discussion on what the slogan should say. We finally decided upon, "The dream began here in reality."

The name-tag selection wasn't much easier. Once we had 3 basic design choices for the name-tags, I could do slight variations on them. As Kit said

when I showed everyone the second batch to vote on, "you're not making this easy are you?". I took that as a complement that you liked the designs I had come up with. This was a two month or longer process. Once we decided on that, I could begin making them.

Here's where my headaches really began. First of all, printing with my Dad's Epson Stylus Color II is not a pleasant process. While it seems to do fine for really simple logos, anything complex and it starts to degrade. I have color bleeding going on, additional white space appearing where it shouldn't, banding problems in solid color areas, regular paper jams as several sheets are sucked through at once, and a whole lot more. I'm actually beginning to think it's malfunctioning, cause it certainly doesn't live up to my expectations or quality standards. Printing problems alone are enough to fill a newsletter and drive a person insane.

Finding correct T-shirts has been a chore. If it wasn't the wrong color, then it was the wrong size. Or if it wasn't that, then it had pockets. Even Hobby Lobby was out of stock and had to have some ordered for me. Additional delays occurred when the original back side printing contained vellow letters in the rainbow effect. That showed up fine on the gray sample I used, but disappeared on the white T-shirts we had. More transfers had to be bought and printed in a new color scheme.

Ironing them on is a 10 minute, sweaty process. If you don't get the pressure, time, and heat distribution right, you screw up an entire T-shirt. And often times, this doesn't occur till the second side is being done. Your burn your fingers from peeling the hot transfer paper off, or the transfer process won't work right. You name it; it can go wrong. You're in even more trouble if a small wrinkle develops or it cools before you can pull it off.


Name-tags had their own production hassles. They also showed print quality flaws more easily than the transfers did. Even using high quality glossed paper didn't help. I finally chose the best of the various papers and hoped that the printer would cooperate. Then I had to cut them out. which wasn't an exact science either. Nor could I use Kinko's standard lamination badge since it was smaller than the design we had chose. So I found some 5 mil thick badges at Office Depot. Unfortunately, I don't have a laminator, so I had to settle for the results given by using a clothes iron on them, which seemed to work decently.

I had to settle for buying alligator clips individually, since those aren't sold in bulk. But in order to use them, I had to get Kinko's to punch holes in the finished badges. On the first attempt, the guy punched an extraneous hole in our ship's name. The next time he couldn't



find the center of the badge, and ended up putting holes off-center and larger than necessary. Who trains these idiots anyway? At least they didn't charge me for the hole punching due to the mistakes. Small consolation since it ruined the prints and the lamination pouch, not to mention delayed production even more.

He was all dressed in gray from his head to his foot,


And his clothes were all tarnished with solder and soot.

CHALLENGE

Venting frustration and challenging everyone to do better.

Interest in the *Wernher* von Braun has been slipping away over the past 3 years. For example, we once had over 30 people attending the meetings; now we do good to pass 15. Our activities draw less than 10 people. Our STARFLEET membership use to total almost 30 members; now we're barely holding onto the 10 minimum. Why?

Has everyone's obligations changed on them so much that the first Sunday at 2 PM is now bad for them? When I conducted the survey when I first took over, Sunday afternoons were indicated as the best time to have an activity, followed closely by Saturday. Do we need to change activity times and days? But Fleet membership requires only a bit of money and no time at all. Sure, 1996 was a bad year for Fleet that caused a lot of people to turn on the organization, but they've since started rebuilding better than before. (See the "STARFLEET News" article on page 31 for more information.) Is it the finances? Am I not doing a good enough job? Are there other personal reasons I'm unaware of? I'd really like to know, as the situation is getting critical.

The apathy on this ship has gotten ridiculously bad. Frankly, I'm ashamed of the amount of participation being shown by the crew. In fact, we didn't even have a quorum to conduct October's meeting. That's disappointing and disheartening for me. I realize occasionally people may miss a meeting or activity due to prior obligations, or an emergency will crop up; but this has gone beyond an occasional thing into a major, recurring problem.

Furthermore, no one wants to do anything. I end up doing everything. That's not the way it's suppose to work. When I first started as CO, I had the philosophy that I wasn't gonna ask anyone to do something that I wouldn't do myself. I still believe in leading by example. However, I think some have taken that to mean I should do everything. I'm not going to, nor can I. I'm burning out as it is. Good thing I work part-time for my parents, cause there would be no way to do this working a regular job.

At the very least, a CO should delegate the workload out to others and simply oversee the projects to make sure they are done. The others are the ones who should be doing the actual grunt work, not me. Unfortunately, it hasn't been like that. When I ask for volunteers, I am met with silence, even among the Department Chiefs. No one wants to volunteer to do anything. That's disappointing and disheartening at best.

I practically have to beg, or specifically ask someone to do something. Why? I will be there to help you if needed; I can train you as well if that's the case. I know you people are talented individuals, but your "let me help" attitude, which is often the rallying call of STARFLEET, leaves much to be desired. Well frankly, I'm growing too weary to carry the slack.

Don't get me wrong, a few individuals have performed beautifully. And I'm sure everyone has done at least one thing to help me since I've been here. For these things, no matter how small or how much. I thank you. It has made my life and my job as CO that much easier. I would name names for those wonderful bits of help, but I can't do so and honestly cover everyone and everything. You will have to remain content in the knowledge you have helped me some, and in the thanks I hopefully gave you when you did. Unfortunately, the help has not been enough lately.

When we won several awards at the 1997 Region 2 Summit, I had high hopes that we would win even more in 1998. Unfortunately, we've slipped since then. Very little has been noteworthy enough to even beg consideration for a regional award. However, now is the time to start building toward a glorious 1998.

Therefore, I challenge you to do something for the USS *Wernher von Braun* and its causes. Yes, you means everyone, myself as well. This can be

as simple or as grandiose as you want. I can here some of you whining, "but I can't do anything." Of course you can! Let me elaborate with some ideas.

Attending a meeting is the simplest way to help, or even some of our other fun. social events. Make sure you've paid your annual Active membership dues of \$10. Join or renew with STARFLEET. Add your immediate family members to your STARFLEET membership. For those of you on tight budgets who can't, then persuade your friends to join. Don't know what to give a friend for a gift, how about paying their membership? Or simply donate a few dollars to the ships treasury if you happen to be financially fortunate.

15 Minutes Later:



STARFLEET NEWS

A summary of events over the past year

What a year 1997 has been for STARFLEET, the International Star Trek Fan Association. Even though they didn't get to start until a week after January began, Mike Smith and his team hit the ground running as fast as they could. Their first order of business was to obtain all materials from the previous administration. Unfortunately, what Jim Herring had to pass along from Dan McGinnis was not very much at all. Fleet had very little funds and almost \$20,000 in bills to pay, not to mention IRS problems looming over us.

Immediately after assuming the Commander, STARFLEET position, Mike Smith made several announcements. Among them, he repealed the Flag Officer promotions requirements and the punitive actions against Bill Herman by McGinnis that many felt were completely unjust. He then set in motion the difficult process of determining exactly what actions needed to be taken with the IRS and the Communiqué. He returned to the pre-IC 96 membership rates of \$15 for individuals. While many chapters complained about the \$12 annual Chapter Charter Fee, this was indeed a needed expense in order to pay for the administrative costs of the Command Status Report. He also instigated a very thorough accounting system that would create a double check on all

moneys received by Fleet.
Furthermore, he appointed
Marlene Miller as Treasurer and
Howard Crosnon as Internal
Auditor to better track finances.

Most of this was in reaction to correct problems and debts that McGinnis caused. No one has heard anything from him, and even have to communicate through his lawyers. In fact, it seems everyone who renewed or joined in the last half of 1996 had their checks cashed, but never received their membership materials or *Communiqués*. How-

ever, Regional
Coordinators
did receive
rough copies
of the issues
that Doug
Glenn produced, but

McGinnis never copied or mailed them for everyone. Therefore, where are all the financial records and money for the last half of 1996? Smith has said that McGinnis is under investigation and we will take appropriate legal action if possible. Ironically, on November 7, an article appeared in local St. Louis papers stating that the FBI has arrested and charged McGinnis with embezzling \$68,000 from his employer, Downtown St. Louis Inc. While innocent until proven guilty in a court of law, this is just too much to be a coincidence.

One of the first things to receive priority attention was the membership database. Herring held onto it for a while trying to enter forgotten memberships from McGinnis. Even when Sal Lizard got the database in mid-February, it was woefully out of date and incorrect. Not only were addresses wrong, but ship crew assignments were almost totally inaccurate. The team at Computer Operaterations worked many long hours to get the database up to speed. Their first objective was to redo the database into something they could work with. They then made processing new and renewing

memberships the main priority. Since they did not have the finances, they were only able to send out membership cards and certificates. Their next priority was to send out membership cards to everyone from 1996.

They accomplished their monumental task by splitting the workload among their team. Mandi Hermann was responsible for processing new and renewing applications. Liz Woolf handled the general questions and corrections to the database. Lizard also continued

to oversee the process and actually mailing out the materials. If you believe McGinnis, we had approximately 9000 members at our largest. We have remained at just over 4000 members this year. Either McGinnis lied about the ever growing numbers, or we have lost over

half of Fleet's members due to his actions, disagreements over who won the election, or some other unknown dissatisfaction.

Anyone who joined prior to December 1, 1997 should have received their membership card and certificate, including all of 1996 and 1997 members. All 1996, and very early and very recent 1997 members have received the remaining parts of the membership materials, such as the handbook, vessel registry, etc. However, there are a few who still have not received the second part. Otherwise, processing time should take six to eight weeks, which is the average wait period for any business. If you have not received your materials, then you need to let me know so I can have them sent to you.

Communiqués are another area to receive priority attention by a team of individuals. Greg Trotter was appointed as the Communiqué Editor. Issue 79 (February/March), the first issue under the Smith administration arrived promptly

under a flurry of excitement and color. It looked fabulous with full color inside spread and covers, along with spot color throughout. However, a few weren't happy with the newsprint, tabloid-sized format. Unfortunately, problems with the printer caused a major delay in issue 80, as well as quality problems.

Ever since then, the CQ has been behind schedule, though coming out on a regular basis.

Issues 79 through 83 (October/November) of the *Communiqué* have been mailed, though at bulk rate. The Periodicals Class permit was another thing that McGinnis claimed to have acquired, but didn't actually do. Bulk rate mailings can wait around up to

two months, and are NOT forwarded.
They had announced procedures at the beginning of the year to secure a Periodicals Class (Second) rate for mailing.
Unfortunately, the Post Office shows no records of their application when they

went back to check in November. Suffice to say, they complained, and filed for the Periodicals Class Permit again.

Other Fleet publications have returned as well. *Command Status Reports* are coming out, though maybe not quite as regularly or as quickly in

previous years. Stellar Visions, the STARFLEET bi-annual fanzine, is being published twice a year, with the second issue coming out in December. If you have a submission, E-mail it to kitten@excaliber.net, or send postal mail to:

Any artwork, stories, poems, filksongs, etc. that are published will entitle the author/ artist to a free issue of the fanzine. They are also looking for cover art. Back issues of issue I are still available, and issue II should be ready by now. Cost is \$13 each, or \$24 for 2 issues per year. (Write "Yearly Subscription" in the memo field.) Careful budgeting and cost saving measures throughout the year have allowed Fleet to finally make good on several of it's financial obligations. First, all 1995 and 1996 Scholarships have been paid. Unfortunately, due to the financial drain this has

caused, and the other more important financial obligations, 1997 scholarships will not be awarded. Also, a \$1200 check has been made out to the "The Ryan White Foundation" which is the money that resided in the Challenge of the Heart account. Additionally, Region 2 recently

presented a separate \$1400 check of its own. These funds were raised at the 1997 Summit auction and pie toss.

In other money news, the first financial report appeared in the July/August CSR. Total income for STARFLEET from January 1 through May 31, 1997, has been \$22,115. The previous administration had \$6729 worth of expenses and

\$10,008 by the current adminstration, for a total expenses of \$16,737. That leaves a net income of \$5378. They finally received some forwarded statements from the bank McGinnis used. With the help of the bank's manager, they were able to get \$4123

transferred to us. However, that still doesn't account for a large sum of money that should have been in the various accounts McGinnis had established. Therefore, the total cash on hand as of May 31, 1997 was \$9501 to the good.

However, STARFLEET would have folded had it not been for people renewing their memberships after Smith was elected. Many people let their membership lapse at the end of 1996, specifically wiating for someone new to take over, and many are still waiting to see if Fleet will survive. Well, not only has it survived, but 1998 looks to be the year it will start growing again. Additionally, approximately 225 chapters paid their Chapter Charter fee in 1997, which also helped save

Internal Revenue Service problems concerning failure to file tax returns have finally been resolved. Apparently, former Commander, STARFLEET Jeanette Maddox was not aware that as an incorporated organization, STARFLEET must file tax returns regardless of our income and our not-for-profit status. The IRS has established a fine for failure to file Fiscal Year 90/ 91 and 91/92 tax forms. These installment payments will equal \$600 per month for 13 to 14 months. Mike Smith commented later that he felt Fleet should have no problem with meeting this financial obligation. He has also confirmed at that FY 96/97 has been filed as well. It has been confirmed that

former Commander,

STARFLEET Rob Lerman correctly filed tax returns for FY 92/93 and 93/94. The only questionable year remains the 95/96 FY, in which McGinnis claimed he filed a return. However, no record either by him, the Smith Administration, or the IRS can verify its filing. Therefore, depending on the situation and if it can be proven McGinnis deliberately lied

about the filing,
STARFLEET may or
may not be assessed
further penalties. Mike
Smith and Howard
Cronson deserve
MANY thanks for
finally resolving this
potentially damaging
situation.

OVERSEAS COUPON PROJECT

Collecting coupons in order to help others.

In mid-November, Mike Henigan, Region 2's Chief of Staff, issued a challenge to all the ships in Region 2. It appears he's disappointed in the lack of participation in the Overseas Coupon Project. Just what is the project you may ask? Good question, I'll try to answer it as best I can.

The OCP is designed to aid our military troops overseas. Apparently, they can use manufactures coupons at their base supply stores. And on limited budgets, their value is greatly appreciated. This project is designed to collect, trim, count, and organize manufacturers coupons, then send them overseas to our troops to use. Actually, this is a great idea. You might as well make them worth the wood pulp they're printed on by giving them to someone who could really use them.



In Mike's E-mail, he mentioned that so far, coupons totaling \$555,000 have been sent to our troops. Only six chapters in our Region have participated (Davinci, Guardian, Haise, Hephaestus, Republic and Triumph.) Our region totaled \$46.684.42 which is 8.6% of the total. Mike feels it "should be more like 10-12% at the very least." While this is much more than last year's total, we rank fifth as a region this year compared to our third place last year.

OPERATION: EAGLE

Supporting our troops overseas with letters.

Regardless of how you feel about our military presence abroad, our troops need our moral support, especially during the holiday season. A letter or care package can do wonders to cheer up a soldier far from home, friends, family, and anything he or she holds dear. It's important to show support to the people regardless of political actions, because at some point in the future, the very same soldier may be fighting to protect your family and freedom.

For almost 15 years, Bill Herrman, former Commanding Officer of the USS Rutledge in South Carolina, has directed Operation: Eagle. This project encourages people to send letters, cards, gifts, and care packages to troops stationed overseas. The information that follows is taken from his numerous (and lengthly) postings to the STARFLEET mailing list. While not an official STARFLEET project, it is a good one. He has sent over 600 TONS of volunteer mail to places such as Beirut, Saudi Arabia, the Persian Gulf, Europe, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Somalia, and Grenada.



This year, The US Navy's Aircraft Carrier BattleGroup Seven operating in the Middle East and Persian Gulf has been selected as the focus of the mail campaign. As of this writing there were over 22 ships, 114 tactical aircraft, and 20,000 sailors stationed there. Hopefully, tensions won't escalate into a full scale war like they did in the past. The address format is as follows: Ship Name, followed by "attn: Any Serviceperson", and the FPO mailing address. I've removed the "attn: Any Serviceperson" from all but the first address in order to save space, but PLEASE include it. If you want to send a large poster for the entire crew, send it to "attn : Commanding Officer" instead of "Any Serviceperson." For example: USS Nimitz CVN-68 attn: Any Serviceperson

Even though this project is mainly designed for the holidays, please consider writing the troops at any time. I'm sure they'd appreciate any correspondence and care packages they could receive. 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VOYAGER

Synopses and Rumors.

The following information was taken from MajCullah's *Star Trek Voyager* Page at http://www.geocities.com/Hollywood/7647/ on the WWW.

"Message in a Bottle"

Voyager discovers an alien relay network that allows them to pick up a distant signature of a Starfleet ship in the far reaches of the Alpha Quadrant. They try to send messages, but have no luck. They eventually realize that the alien technology will allow them to send the EMH through to the other ship. The Doctor transfers over and finds himself on the USS Prometheus, an experimental Starfleet ship. However, the entire crew is dead and the ship is commandeered by Romulans. The Doctor activates the Prometheus' EMH, and the two of them work together to overthrow the Romulans. The Prometheus' Doctor is an LMH. a Long-term Medical Hologram, specifically designed for situations like *Voyager*'s.

Once they overcome the Romulans, they try to operate the ship. Starfleet forces attack the *Prometheus*, thinking that

it's still under the command of the Romulans. The misunder-standing is cleared up, and *Voyager*'s Doctor is transfered back. Starfleet had assumed that *Voyager* was destroyed three years ago, but knows *Voyager*'s situation and is mounting a rescue mission.

"Waking Moments"

The whole crew enters a dream state, where the one thing in common is an alien in each dream. The Doctor has to save the day again. A Janeway and Chakotay kiss was apparently cut out of this episode.

"Hunters"

This episode begins a five part story arc similar to the beginning of this season of *Deep Space Nine. Voyager* returns to the alien subspace relay network they found in "Message In A Bottle" to pick up messages from Starfleet. The crew finally hears from many of their loved ones. The big news for the crew is the demise of the Maquis in the Alpha Quadrant and Janeway's significant other, who has moved on with his life and gotten married.

Things get complicated when the Hirogen, the aliens who claim ownership of the array network show up. Even though they didn't build them, the Hirogen now control the area. The Hirogen are warlike, aggressive beings with body armor and advanced weaponry. They also enjoy hunting other humanoids for recreation.

Tuvok and Seven, who are aboard a shuttle at the time, are captured. Just before they are to be gutted and made into trophies, they escape in the nick of time. The Hirogen are defeated when *Voyager* lures their ship into one of the quantum singularities that powers the subspace relays. The resulting destruction, unfortunately, renders the relays nonfunctional. *Voyager* loses its link to the Alpha Quadrant, and resumes its course home.

"Prey"

When *Voyager* comes across a badly mangled Hirogen ship, they manage to save one of the wounded Hirogen. The wounded Hirogen reveals that they got attacked by their latest would-be prey, who turned out to be more than one ship could handle. They discover that the prey is actually Species 8472 that kicked the Borg's butt. It manages to bore a hole in the side of *Voyager*'s hull and wreak havoc inside the ship.

Other Hirogen vessels show up, intending to either catch species 8472 or destroy it, and *Voyager*'s crew along with it. Janeway is determined

to save the 8472 from the Hirogen, but Seven disobeys orders and beams 8472 into one of the Hirogen ships. Janeway reprimands Seven of Nine for her actions as they make a hasty departure with the fate of 8472 in question.

"Retrospect"


An alien weapons trader gets accused of attacking Seven of Nine, and then stealing some of her Borg nanoprobes. Tuvok investigates the situation and the evidence he finds points to the alien who attacked Seven. However, the story really gets exciting and mysterious when the alien who attacked Seven is found dead. Unfortuantly, this plot synopsis doesn't seem to fit in with the rest of the five part story arc.

"Killing Game, Part I"

The episode starts off with members of the crew in the middle of Nazi Europe in World War II, not aware of their true identities. Janeway is a leader in the French Resistance, Neelix is a baker who works for the Resistance, Seven is a German dancing girl, B'Elanna is a pregnant woman, Chakotay is an American captain in the Allied Forces, Paris is his lieutenant, and the members of the Nazi army are the Hirogen. It turns out that *Voyager* has been taken over by the Hirogen. Obsessed with hunting prey, the Hirogen did some research on their prey and decided to conduct the hunt in a holodeck recreation of Nazi Germany.

The *Voyager* crew has been implanted with devices linked to the ship's computers to make them think that they are really the characters they are playing. Two exceptions are Kim and the Doctor, who are keeping the badly damaged *Voyager* running under the Hirogen.

The Hirogen are often successful in trapping and mangling *Voyager*'s crewmembers. But since they are in it for



the thrill of the hunt, the victims are sent to the Doctor so he can patch them up, only to be sent back to the simulation again. Seven finally winds up in sickbay and the Doctor defeats the implant thanks to her Borg implants. After she's returned to the simulation, a time-delayed

device the Doc implants overrides the Hirogen device and restores her memory. Apparently this happens right in the middle of Seven singing. She tries to cover, but those around her suspect that she's a "spy."

The Doc and Kim manage to disrupt Janeway's device too, just as her Resistance cell attacks a Nazi communications building and blows it up. But since the holodeck safeties are off, the explosion breaches the holodeck and into three decks of the Voyager itself. We're going to get a visual of Universal Studios' European Street with a CGI "hole" exposing the crosssection of three decks of Voyager. The Resistance fighters are startled at what they conclude to be a "secret German bunker" and move in.

"The Killing Game, Part II"

The crew members, who have forgotten their true identities, invade what they believe to be a German bunker, which is actually the halls of *Voyager*. The hunting grounds get expanded when Kim is forced to install portable emitters throughout the ship. Janeway, Seven, and the Doc deactivate the crew's implants, by torching Sickbay, where the control center for the implants is located. Janeway tries to make a deal with the devil again this year, by trying to convince the Hirogen to leave in return for technology. The Hirogen of course, don't accept.

General Rumors:

Voyager may or may not be getting the uniforms seen in First Contact. It may occur after "Hunters" since this is when Voyager goes back to the message array to retrieve messages from home. Jeri Taylor, one of the *Voyager*'s producers is retiring and Brannon Braga will be taking her place. Ensign Wildman's baby (born less than 2 years ago) is suddenly six years old. Neelix tells her goodnight stories. A native American consultant was hired for an upcoming Chakotay episode involving Indian tribes.

"Q and Son" Read with care as this episode may be completely false. Q returns with his son that is now 3 to 4 years old. Q claims that he is planning a surprise for everyone and goes off somewhere, leaving his son to wreck havok on the ship. It does star the female Q as well as John De Lancie.

As you well know. WAAY is no longer carrying Voyager episodes. We, however, have acquired tapes from Carol Burhans of the *Dark* Silence Station in Decatur and from Pete Mohney of the USS Hephaestus in Birmingham. Recently, one of our E-mail contacts informed me that Wireless One cable carries a UPN affiliate out of Boston (cable channel 42). She has indicated that she may be willing to host a party at her house for a live broadcast. In any event, we may be able to get better quality recordings.

The good and bad of stars and guests at conventions.


On September 13, 1997, I attended a Vulkon in Atlanta. As most people know, this is one of those canned cons put on by professionals for a profit. There is very little, if any, fan involvement. The good thing about these conventions is that they can afford to bring in the big name guests. In this case, Robert Beltran who plays Chakotay on Star Trek: Voyager and Richard Biggs who plays Dr. Franklin on Babylon 5. Some of you may remember that Beltran's appearance this time was due to a rescheduling after a previously planned appearance had to be canceled.

I left for Atlanta Friday night with some friends who are Babylon 5 fans but not Trek fans. They decided to take this really weird route through the backwoods of Alabama. Not only was I worried about being stuck in the boonies, but the twisty roads over the tip of the Appalachians had me tense to say the least; not to mention it was dark and the driver was going like a bat out of Klinzai. Because this was a last minute decision to attend, we were staying at a hotel different than the Castlegate midtown. Fortunately, it was only about four blocks from the Castlegate. This turned out to be a very good thing though.

however, spent considerably more. They bought some *Babylon 5* t-shirts, a coffee mug, and a bloopers tape. I should have bought a fifth pip, but I didn't have the finances to buy a complete set, since I wanted them to all look equal.

Remember I told you it was a good thing we had stayed at a different hotel? Well, the reason being is that Castlegate Midtown management is probably the worst in hotel history. First of all, they overbooked their guests. When people started arriving Friday night, they had to turn some people away who had confirmed reservations for months. Furthermore, the hotel also apparently lost their convention license a week before and was not even suppose to host this convention. I found out later that they were even violating fire and health codes as well. and are now closed down. Richard Biggs' presentation was first at 2 PM EST. He turned out to be one of the most entertaining and friendly guests I know. He was quite charming and witty, and seemed like he was enjoying himself on stage. Unfortunately, he wouldn't reveal any upcoming secrets about the show. In fact, he joked that J. M. Stracynski, the creator of Babylon 5, could tell if he gave anything way. He joked (I think) about JMS calling him in his hotel room immediately after having given some secrets away during a presentation before. He also commented on his love of the show and how he wishes it could continue forever. Apparently, him and Jerry Doyle (Garibali) are great drinking buddies and want to milk the fame and steady work of Babylon 5 for all it's worth.

Another story Biggs told involved a practical joke played on JMS. As you know, the Great Maker is quickly developing a following bordering on an obsessive religious cult. (I think I'm about to join after doing this newsletter.) At one convention in California. Andreas Katsulas and Peter Jurasik (G'Kar and Londo) got the audience to participate. They had the audience NOT applaud or react when JMS came out on the stage, which unnerved him greatly. Even after they finally let the audience recognize JMS with the accolades he deserves, JMS vowed to get revenge. Apparently, a few months later, they received the scripts for the next episode. In it, G'Kar

undergoes this weird metamorphosis into a female, which Londo eventually seduces, complete with a bedroom scene. It wasn't until they actually started shooting that they were given the real scripts.

Robert Beltran's presentation, however, left much to be desired. Of course, the audience wasn't helping much either, especially the female members. He seemed able to steer the audience in the right direction to prevent it from degrading. I can't recommend seeing Robert Beltran at all, though he might be better if he had a wellbehaved audience. On the other hand, I'd highly recommend seeing Richard Biggs, as I enjoyed myself thoroughly.

So we drove around trying to find a nice restaurant, but settled on fast food after 15 minutes.

The next morning I got up so I could attend a Richard Arnold discussion. He had news about upcoming *Star Trek* episodes. After that, I attended a *Babylon 5* discussion with Donna Tucker of the USS *Yamota* in Birmingham.

While I would have preferred to have stayed all afternoon so we could attend a second auction and autograph session, my friends wanted to return home before it got dark. We left around 1 PM EST for home.

Overall, the convention was enjoyable despite Beltran's presentation and the hotel quality. Biggs was certainly an enjoyable quest. These canned cons, as they are called, can at least deliver big name stars for a relatively cheap price. They may not be as friendly or as personable as fan run cons, but they can still be enjoyed. I was there as a fan for a change, and didn't worry in the least bit about ship business.

BABYLON 5 RETURNS



Our last, best hope survives for a fifth season.

For those who have been beyond the rim of known space for the past year, Babylon 5 our last, best hope for good science-fiction on television has been renewed for its fifth season. Originally conceived by J. Michael Straczynski (JMS) for a five year story arc, B5 is now able to complete its grand space epic. Every year, they had to fight to survive. But the odds looked so bleak this time, they even filmed the final episode of the series, which JMS has known about since the series began.

Fortunately, Turner Network Television (TNT) negotiated for the rights to air the fifth season of Babylon 5 beginning in January 1997. However, they have a few surprises up their sleeve. Instead of beginning with the two hour premiere movie, 'The Gathering," they will broadcast a new 2 hour, made-for-TV movie entitled 'In the Beginning." This is a prequel to the series that sets the stage for events we've only glimpsed during the series. These two movies will be shown back to back to kick off TNT's rebroadcast of the entire series.

The following information has been combined from several sources. Some of the episode synopsis located at the end of the article may contain spoiler information, so don't read those if you don't want to know what happens. The rest of

the information is related to scheduling and behind the scenes stuff. Most of the information is taken from the "Lurker's Guide to Babylon 5." which is located at http:// www.midwinter.com/lurk/ on the World Wide Web. Other information has been taken from TNT's own web site located at http://tnt.turner.com/ babylon5/ and the Warner Brothers official fan club at http://www.thestation.com/. Most pictures (indicated with a -SJ suffix) and the fifth season information was taken from the "Babylon 5 Spoiler Junkies Page" at http://www.visi.com/ ~wildfoto/spoilers.html on the web. Lurker's Guide images end with a -LG suffix. All images belong to the copyright holders: PTN Consortium (I think.) Heck, it

TNT kicks off the Babylon 5 frenzy on December 28 at 7 PM CST. Bruce Boxleitner (John Sheridan) and Jerry Doyle (Michael Garabaldi) host a presentation of 2001: A Space Odyssey. Shortly thereafter, a thirty minute special entitled What is Babylon 5? airs at 10 PM CST. Now make plans for Sunday night, January 4, 1998, when "In the Beginning" premieres at 7 PM CST. Then prepare for a treat at 9 PM CST when they broadcast a special version of the premier movie, 'The Gathering." Details about both movies are available later on. They will replay What is Babylon 5? And "In the Beginning" at various times. (See the broadcast schedule sidebar on the opposite page.)





On the next day, (Monday, January 5) repeats of seasons one through four air every week night, Monday through Friday, at 6 PM CST. Beginning January 21, the fifth season episodes air every Wednesday at 9 PM CST. They will replay that week's fifth season episode on the following Saturday at 6 PM CST. Set your VCR's now and stock up on tape. Oh, sometime in late Spring of 1998, they plan on airing the second new Babylon 5 movie, "Third Space," though a definite date has not been set vet.

The episodes will air with closed captioning and stereo surround sound where available. They will also air in the proper order as specified by JMS. They have even talked about doing special airings of letter box editions. However, they plan on doing voice-overs during the closing credits for most episodes, and maybe even a few squeezed credits. Fortunately, they have agreed to show the regular ending on the following episodes: "Chrysalis," "And Now for a Word," "The Fall of Night," "Walkabout," "And the Rock Cried Out, No Hiding Place," "Z'Ha'Dum," and "Atonement." Even worse, they will probably have the small, semitransparent TNT ghost logo displayed in the corner of the screen some of the time.

The following topics will be covered: Information about 'In the Beginning," changes to 'The Gathering," the departure of Claudia Christian and the introduction of Tracy Scoggins, news of a possible spin-off series, and general plot synopsis for the entire series.

"In the Beginning" doesn't start with the creation of the world, (I don't think, given that we have seen the end of it.) but it does cover a lot of details that lead up to the forming of the Babylon 5 station. Written by JMS, the movie is directed by Mike Vejar. The main focus will be on the Earth-Minbari War and the period that predates the current series main timeline starting in 2257. We may even learn who built the Great Ma-

chine on Epsilon 3 and learn more of the Sinclair/Valen transformation. An old Londo Molari narrates the story to a group of Minbari school children. Apparently, this narration occurs right before the scene in "War Without End, Part 2," when Sheridan and Delenn are brought before him. JMS has commented that the movie does an excellent job of introducing the Babylon story to everyone. However, as a result, it may spoil some of the mysteries that occur in the first seasons. Of course, at times we've already known what was going to happen, only to be completely enthralled by how we were taken there.

"The Gathering" has been re-edited and re-scored for its presentation on TNT. The reedited version will contain

additional material. new music by Christopher Franke, and new CGI (Computer Graphics Imaging). Several scenes were cut from the original

broadcast version due to time constraints, and they may try to add them back in. First up is a scene at the very beginning in which Jeffery Sinclair, the first Commander of Babylon 5, prevents a human and an alien from making a mistake with each other. No more can be said without ruining the punch line, though it's nothing new as far as ideas go. The other scene




involves Doctor Kyle, B5's original doctor in the premiere movie, talking to Laurel about what he saw inside Kosh's encounter suit. Suffice to say it bordered on a religious experience that forever changed his outlook on life.

When it comes to the departure of Claudia Christian (Susan Ivanova), it becomes a matter of he said/she said. What it all boils down to is the fact that Christian wanted time off to do movie work during season five's filming schedule, and specifically asked for it in her contract. However, Warner Brothers and JMS could not give that to her in writing. However, JMS said that he would be willing to write the scripts in season five so that she would not need to appear in a few episodes. This, apparently, was not acceptable as Christian apparently decided to not sign the offered contracts by the necessary deadlines. Since he had to start immediately on the scripting so episode filming could begin, JMS wrote

Since JMS did not want to recast the role in case Christian wanted to come back for guest appearances or movies, he wrote the script so a new character could be introduced. Tracy Scoggins plays the role of the new Babylon 5 Commander, Captain Elizabeth Lochley. Unlike the rest of our favorite regulars who we've come to

An old Londo from "In the Beginning" -SJ




love and trust, this character's loyalties are in question since she supported President Clark.

The Babylon Project: Crusade is the spin-off series to Babylon 5. JMS has said that he has "worked out the details for 1.000 years in either direction for the B5 storyline in general, and in specific for 100 years in either direction." And since the very beginning, he has considered a separate story line that is set in the same universe as Bayblon 5, but not involving the station or its main characters. The plot will focus heavily on the rangers, who will be attempting to tract down a cure for a deadly virus. This virus causes a very painful, gruesome death and is highly contagious.

Crusade takes place about a year or two after the events of the B5 arc. The Shadow War is over, but the allies of the Shadows remain looking for a new home. Toward that end, they target Earth, but their attempt at conquest and destruction ends badly for them. In one last ditch effort of retribution, they leave behind a biogenetically engineered virus, which is a piece of leftover Shadow technology.

The virus has an incubation period of roughly five years, during which time it adapts to its host species. At the end of that adaptation period, it turns lethal. Released into the atmosphere of Earth, it will essentially wipe out every man, woman and child on Earth who

was there when the virus was released unless a cure is found. The Ranger fleet will scour worlds on the Rim and elsewhere for leftover First One cities. The First Ones technology, which was used to create the virus, is the only way to find a cure in time.

The pilot movie or episode would deal with the assault on Earth and the release of the virus. The series itself would deal with the search. Central characters would include one of the nine surviving Zathras brothers, the command staff of one of the main explorer vessels *The Excalibur*, a warrior

caste Minbari, the lone survivor of a world wiped out by the Shadow allies, a lone Technomage sent back to see if the coast is clear for the others to come back, and finally, a bioigeneticist, who is a representative from Interplanetary Expeditions and may not have the same motives as the rest.

While that will be the overall agenda and characters, the series will not be as set on a rigid path (or arc if you prefer) as *Babylon 5*. JMS wants to try something different, given how stressful B5 was to write.





Originally, "Sleeping in Light" had production number 422 when they thought there would be no season five. "The Deconstruction of Falling Stars" had a production number of 501, and the rest of the fifth season episodes actually had a production number one greater that what they currently have. However, once TNT picked up the series, "Sleeping in Light" was renumbered to 522 and "The Deconstruction of Falling Stars" was renumbered to 422. I'm not certain if there will be episodes with a production number of 515 through 521.



Since the last four episodes of season four were moved to a really odd time, I've went ahead and included more detailed spoiler information below. Plus, the little that is known about the fifth season is listed below as well, including rumors on how the series ends.

"Between the Darkness and the Light"

After Mars Resistance captures Garibaldi, Lyta scans him despite Bester's blocks and discovers Bester's scheme and manipulation of Garibaldi. Along with Franklin, they



succeed in freeing Sheridan. Londo and G'Kar convince the League of Non-Aligned Worlds to ioin the fight against Clark. After discovering that that Earth has managed to adapt Shadow technology to their ships, Ivanova leads the White Star fleet in defeating the ambush. Unfortunately, she is mortally wounded and is not expected to live more than a week. As a last request, Ivanova asks Sheridan to assume command of the Agamemnon, his former ship, and lead them into the final battle against Clark.

"Endgame"

The battle for earth climaxes with Sheridan's forces attacking Clark's forces at Mars, and finally at Earth itself. Sheridan's plans for the frozen telepaths is revealed when he has them smuggled onboard Earth Alliance ships. Lyta then awakens them and has them take control of the ships, defeating most of the ships at Mars. Once at Earth, Clark commits suicide to prevent capture. Marcus uses the alien healing machine ("The Quality of Mercy" and "Revelations") to give his life to Ivanova, apparently dying to save her life.

"Rising Star"

Delenn oversees the coming together of the non-aligned worlds and the other four main races to form a new Interstellar Alliance, with Sheridan as its first president. The Alliance is a confederation

whose members retain most of their sovereignty, aside from certain rules of conduct and sharing of technologies. With temporary headquarters on Babylon 5, the Alliance uses the Rangers and the White Star fleet as its armed forces. Ivanova, promoted to captain, has taken a new assignment to shake down an experimental Earth military vessel. (Claudia Christian refused to sign her contract for the fifth season.) Londo returned to Centauri Prime to eventually become Emperor once the ill Regent dies. Garibaldi found Lise, Sheridan and Delenn were married, and Sheridan's father was released.

Alliance as well as Sheridan's motives and abilities. In 2262, Captain Lochley will be in charge of *Bayblon 5* and Sheridan allows a colony of telepaths to form on the station. Garibaldi will end up as a hostage, possibly by the telepaths who have turned against them. Also, Sheridan

"The Deconstruction of Falling Stars"

In the future, analysts and historians question the validity of the Interstellar and Delenn's son David apparently causes some problems for his parents. In 2282, *Babylon 5* will be destroyed and Sheridan will die under mysterious

circumstances. In 2762, Earth will again be divided into two factions: one in favor of breaking away from the Interstellar Alliance and another in favor of remaining. The two sides will launch a devastating war, rendering the surface of the Earth nearly uninhabitable. In 3262, the survivors of that war. now known as the "Great Burn," will largely have lost all records of the time before the war. An order of monks, aided by the Rangers in disguise, will work to gather and preserve historical records and technology, which people blame for Earth's destruction. In a million years, the Rangers help establish a "New Earth" on a distant planet because our sun goes nova under mysterious circumstances. Humans have apparently evolved into energy beings that use an encounter suit and organic ships, similar to the Vorlons.

Other episode rumors:

"The Very Long Night of Londo Mollari" was a title borrowed from an unproduced episode that originally focused on Ivanova, though the two scripts had nothing to do with each other. "The Paragon of Animals", which is rumored to feature Lennier, refers to dialog in Shakespeare's "Hamlet," specifically Hamlet's speech in Act 2, Scene 2. Two maintenance workers. Mac and Bo. give us a "A View from the Gallery," which was written by JMS and Harlan Ellison in one day for a slightly different perspective on the station. "In the Kingdom of the Blind" probably deals with G'Kar, since he only has one eye. This is in reference to a quote by Gerard Erasmus: "In the valley of the blind, the one-eyed man is king." Walter Koenig returns as Psi-Cop Bester in "Strange Relations," "Phoenix Rising," and "The Corps is Mother, The Corps is Father."

Remember the characters Rebo and Zooty mentioned in "Rumors, Bargains and Lies" and "Rising Star"? Well, they're paying a visit to Babylon 5 during the "Day of the Dead" festival. In a casting coup of the century, the comic magicians Penn and Teller will play the most popular bumbling comedy team of the 23rd century. Morden, Dodger ("GROPOS"), Adira Tyree ("Born to the Purple"), and others come back to life for 24 hours (sorry, no Marcus). According to Stephen Furst, who directed "The Corps is



Mother, The Corps is Father," Walter Koenig as Bester has a very large part in this episode. The only "regulars" scheduled to appear are Jeff Conaway and Richard Biggs. Apparently, a trainee can't deal with the rigors of the Corps.



When asked about what he could possibly cover in season five since the Shadow and Earth wars are over. JMS posted the following possible plots: The start of the telepath war, the start of the Drakh war (The race who were evacuating from Z'ha'dum in "Epiphanies," and later fought with Delenn in "Lines of Communication."), Londo's fate on Centauri Prime, making the Interstellar Alliance work, interfaction fighting among the Alliance members, the development of Mars as an independent state, the legacy of William



Edgars' black projects, fallout from Earth's civil war and the feelings about it, and how Sheridan/Delenn/Lennier will get along. He said the over all idea would be empire building of the various races and the newly formed Interstellar Alliance.

"Sleeping in Light" is the series finale set in 2281, twenty years after season four. This also corresponds to the time that Lorien predicted that Sheridan had left to live in "Falling Toward Apotheosis." Written and directed by JMS, this episode has cameos of several B5 staff members. including producer John Copeland and co-producer George Johnsen. Be on the look out for a scene involving Sheridan and a mirror. Supposedly, an unintentional lighting effect mirrors something seen previously in "Between the Darkness and the Light" and in "Z'ha'dum," though exactly what is unknown. Suffice to say, when JMS and John Flinn lit the shot, "the skin on my arms crawled." Response from the crew and those who have seen the final episode have been tearful. However, they were tears of joy and not sadness, as the story is supposedly very positive and uplifting. People have said they felt honored to have worked on the series and what it accomplished.

BEHIND BABYLON 5

Who does what.

Babylon 5 was created by Joe Michael Straczynski (JMS), who is executive producer along with Doug Netter. JMS has been involved with genre television for many years, as story editor and writer for the Twilight Zone TV series (syndicated version), Captain Power, and the animated The Real Ghostbusters. He has also written for Jake and the Fatman and Murder, She Wrote. JMS has also had many published

short stories, an anthology, and two fantasy/horror novels. Until recently, he was co-host of *Hour 25*, a Los Angeles area science fiction radio talk show.



Joe Michael Straczynski: The Great Maker -SJ

Doug Netter is an equal partner in Babylon 5 and has been in the business for a long time. He was Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer at MGM Studios from 1970-1975, where his nickname was Rattlesnake, thus Rattlesnake Productions, the production company he founded in 1978. Doug mainly handles the business side and leaves the creative work to Straczynski, which is how they first worked together on Captain Power. Recent executive producer

credits include *Captain Power* and *The Wild West* 10-hour miniseries documentary.

John Copeland is *Baby-lon 5*'s producer. Copeland has been working with Netter since 1977 and together they have produced *The Wild West* and the *Wild Times* miniseries, *Rough-necks, The Sacketts*, and the pilot for *Captain Power*, among others.

John Iacovelli is the production designer, in charge of coming up with new sets and other visual elements. In the past, he has worked on *Honey, I Shrunk the Kids* among other films.

Christopher Franke, formerly of Tangerine Dream, composes the show's soundtrack and wrote the main title themes. His film credits include *McBain*, *Universal Soldier*, and the miniseries *The Tommyknockers*.

Harlan Ellison is the conceptual consultant for the series. He has written a "manifesto" for the show that explains to other writers how to write science fiction for television and *Babylon 5* in particular. On a day-to-day basis, he has no preassigned duties (though he plans to write a script or two) but is something of a generalist, helping refine many aspects of the production, from writing to sets. JMS refers to Ellison's position as "a free-roaming agent of chaos."



Ron Thornton of Foundation Imaging was in charge of the special-effects through season three. The effects won an Emmy for the pilot movie. Thornton has worked on *Terminator 2*, the *Addams Family*, *Captain Power*, *Blake's 7*, *Doctor Who*, and other projects.

Everett Burrell and John Vulich head the make-up team at Optic Nerve studios, and won an Emmy for their work in the first season of B5. They have worked on productions such as Batman Returns, Aliens, Tales From The Crypt, Night of The Living Dead, and The Lost Boys.
